1. FAIR ELECTIONS AND GOVERNANCE

*[HB 2577: Lobbying](#): Requires lobbyist statements filed with Oregon Government Ethics Commission to identify each bill or measure that the lobbyist lobbied on, whether lobbyist lobbied in favor or in opposition, each person or entity that hired lobbyist, and how much money the person or entity paid lobbyist.

*[HB 2578: Small Donor Funded Elections](#): Establishes Small Donor Funded Elections program to enable candidates for state office to receive 6-to-1 match if they agree to a cap of \$2650 per donation.

**[HB 2927: National Popular Vote](#): Enacts Interstate Compact for Agreement Among the States to Elect the President by National Popular Vote. (Same as SB 824, in Senate Rules)

**[HB 2949: Disclosure of Tax Returns for Candidates for Federal Office](#): Requires candidate for President or Vice President to provide a copy of candidate's federal income tax returns for five years preceding year of general election and with written consent for public disclosure of tax returns.

2. HOUSING

*[HB 2002: Preservation of Housing](#): Promotes preservation of publicly supported housing.

-Passed House Committee On Human Services and Housing 4/14; Referred to Ways and Means

>*[HB 2004: Residential Tenancies](#): Prohibits landlord from terminating month-to-month tenancy without cause except under certain circumstances with 90 days' written notice and payment of relocation expenses. Establishes "just cause" provisions when landlords want to reclaim their property. The amendment adopted by the committee 1) exempts landlords with 4 units or fewer from relocation assistance, 2) reduces the amount of relocation assistance required to one month's rent, 3) allows landlords to use no cause evictions within the first six months of tenancy.

Lifts pre-emption on rent stabilization. The amendment also provides some sideboards for rent control: jurisdictions must provide a fair rate of return, provide a process for a landlord to petition for permission to raise rent above the increase allowed under the rent control program when necessary for them to achieve a

fair rate of return, and exempt new residential development for a period of the first five years of its occupancy.

[HB 2006: Mortgage Interest Deduction](#): Caps mortgage interest deduction at \$15,000; eliminates it for single filers with adjusted gross income of \$100,000+ and joint filers with adjusted gross income of \$200,000+.

*[HB 2007: Housing Development](#): Requires city or county to expedite applications for certain housing developments containing affordable housing units as first priority. Important way to increase supply.

[HB 2215: Rights of Persons Experiencing Homelessness](#): Establishes Oregon Right to Rest.

-**DIED in Judiciary**

*[HB 2570: Home Ownership Grant Program](#): Provides grants to eligible nonprofit organizations to provide homeownership assistance to low income households.

-**Passed House Committee On Human Services and Housing 3/30; Referred to Ways and Means**

**[HB 2724: Rent Guarantee Program](#): Provides training for tenants and financial incentives for landlords who rent to low income people with history of debt, incarceration, or other barriers.

-**Passed House Committee On Human Services and Housing 3/30; Referred to Ways and Means**

*[HB 2737: Construction Standards for Tiny Homes](#): Requires Director of Department of Consumer and Business Services to establish special construction standards for homes that have floor area of not more than 250 square feet.

-**Passed House Committee On Business and Labor 4/17; Headed to House Floor**

*[HB 2852: Tax Credit for Affordable Housing Lenders](#): Extends sunset and doubles tax credit for lenders to preserve or build new affordable housing.

-**Passed House Committee On Human Services and Housing 4/18; Referred to Tax Credits**

**[HB 2912: Affordable Housing Land Acquisition Development](#): Establishes Revolving Loan Fund Program for eligible organizations to purchase land for affordable housing development and to provide supportive services to low income households.

*[HB 2996: First-time Home Buyer Savings Accounts](#): Provides tax credit for savings of up to \$5000/yr for ten years to purchase a first home. (Same as SB 849.)

**[HB 3063: Housing for Individuals with Mental Illness](#): Establishes Mental Health Housing Fund, appropriates funds to OHA and requires matching funds to pay for construction and start-up costs of housing for individuals with mental illness. (Codifies a program we funded in the last two sessions.)

****[HB 3357: Document Recording Fee](#)**: Doubles the fees charged and collected by county clerks to record certain real property documents. Transfers fees to Housing and Community Services Department for Emergency Housing Assistance, home ownership, preservation, and construction of affordable housing.

3. HUMAN SERVICES

***[HB 2170: Ombudsmen](#)**: Establishes Office of Oregon Ombudsmen, containing Long Term Care Ombudsman, Residential Facilities Ombudsman, Foster Parent Ombudsman, Foster Child Ombudsman and Oregon Public Guardian and Conservator. Requires DHS to notify foster parents and foster children of Ombudsmen to investigate complaints.

***[HB 2171: Court Appointed Special Advocates \(CASA\)](#)**: Requires sufficient volunteer staff to meet statutory requirement to appoint CASAs in every juvenile dependency proceeding.

***[HB 2216: Foster Children's Sibling Bill of Rights](#)**: Requires DHS to adopt rules to give siblings the right to maintain relationships with each other.

****[HB 2401: Trauma-Informed Training](#)**: Requires DHS and Department of Justice to provide trauma-informed training and curriculum to child welfare personnel.

[HB 2500: Mandated Training for DHS Caseworkers](#): Directs DHS to implement training and continuing education for caseworkers in juvenile dependency proceedings.

***[HB 2547: Programs that Serve Seniors](#)**: Appropriates moneys from General Fund for operation of Gatekeeper program by NorthWest Senior and Disability Services agency.

****[HB 2661: Long Term Care Referral](#)**: With amendment, will require registration with DHS and a set of standards for long term care referral agencies.

***[HB 2881: Oregon Hunger Response Fund](#)**: Appropriates funds to DHS for OHRF.

****[HB 2959: General Assistance Program \(GAP\)](#)**: Appropriates funds to DHS to administer GAP, which provides support for disabled, homeless people who are waiting for their federal SSI/SSDI benefits to be approved.

*[HB 3009/3010: Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program](#): Requires DHS to seek approval from USDA to allow students to apply for SNAP benefits using FAFSA form and to allow full-time post-secondary students to receive SNAP benefits.

*[HB 3041: Tax Credits for Crop Donation](#): Increases, for purposes of tax credit allowed for crop donation to food banks, percentage of wholesale price allowed as amount of credit.

**[HB 3359: Long Term Care](#): Promotes the autonomy of residents of community-based care facilities by ensuring that administrators are licensed, increasing training and education for providers, establishes quality metric council, allows DHS enhanced oversight and supervision for Residential Care Facility oversight.

**[HJM 4: Family Caregivers Act](#): Urges Congress to pass RAISE Family Caregivers Act

**[SB 833: Relating to Suicide](#): Requires hospital that discharges patient following attempted suicide to facilitate referral of patient to peer support program.

4. HEALTH

*[HB 2103: Nurse Practitioners](#): Permits licensed nurse practitioners to perform vasectomies.

[HB 2387: Prescription Drugs](#): Requires pharmaceutical manufacturer to reimburse payers for cost of prescription drug that exceeds specified threshold. (I can't sponsor this since it's a "committee bill" but would if I could!)

*[HB 2402: Homeless Individuals](#): Directs Center for Health Statistics to establish program allowing individual who is homeless to obtain free certified copy of individual's birth record.

*[HB 2517: Programs used to monitor the dispensing of prescription drugs](#): Provides that OHA Director may enter into agreements governing information reported to prescription monitoring program with regulatory authorities of other states.

[HB 2518: Programs used to monitor the dispensing of prescription drugs](#): Requires pharmacy to report de-identified information to prescription monitoring program upon dispensing prescribed naloxone ([2519](#))

>**[HB 2660: Breast Reconstruction](#): Requires OHA and DCBS to create and implement educational campaign about options available to breast cancer patients for insurance coverage of breast reconstruction surgery, breast prostheses and breast forms.

**[HB 2662: Tobacco Tax](#): Increases cigarette tax and provides for distribution of increase in revenue. (Other bills on tobacco tax: [SB 180](#), [HB 2024](#), [HB 2037](#), [HB 2056](#), [HB 2062](#)).

**[HB 2882: Dental Care Organizations](#): Requires governing body of CCO to include representative from at least one dental care organization.

**[HB 3090: Hospital Discharge Procedures](#): Requires hospital to develop policy for patients released from emergency department following treatment for behavioral health crisis.

**[HB 3091: Behavioral Health Treatment](#): Requires specified facilities to provide certain case management and behavioral health services to individual who presents at facility experiencing behavioral health crisis.

**[HB 3181: Dental Screening](#): Provides that statement from parent or guardian releasing student seven years of age or younger from receiving dental screening within previous 12 months may include explanation of reason that student has not received dental screening.

**[HB 3268: Telecommunications](#): Task force to increase utilization of life line telephones for low income people.

-Passed House Committee On Health Care 4/17; Headed to House Floor

>[*HB 3391: Reproductive Health Care](#): Requires health benefit plan coverage of specified health care services, drugs, devices, products and procedures related to reproductive health.

-Passed House Committee On Health Care 4/14; Referred to Ways and Means

*[SB 147: Oral health care for Pacific Islanders](#): Directs DCBS to develop and report recommendations to Legislative Assembly and interim health committees by September 15, 2017, to reimburse costs of oral health care for low-income individuals residing in Oregon under Compact of Free Association treaty.

**[SB 754: Tobacco 21](#): Creates offense of selling tobacco products or inhalant delivery systems to person under 21 years of age.

*[SB 808: Screening Newborns](#): OHA shall specify that health screen testing for newborns may conduct tests for conditions listed on most recent edition of Recommended Uniform Screening Panel by US Department of Health and Human Services.

*[SB 893: Patients with Terminal Diseases](#): Permits identified agent, pursuant to advance directive and in accordance with Oregon Death with Dignity Act, to collect and administer prescription to end patient's life in humane manner if patient ceases to be capable of self-administering life-ending medication.

5. EARLY CHILDHOOD AND EDUCATION

*[HB 2038: School Food Programs](#): Appropriates funds to Department of Ed for grant programs that allow school districts to purchase Oregon food products and to pay for costs related to food-based, agriculture-based and garden-based educational activities.

-Passed House Committee On Agriculture and Natural Resources 4/4; Referred to Ways and Means

**[HB 2223: School Nurses](#): Directs Department of Education to establish program to develop and maintain statewide school nursing services.

-Passed House Committee On Education 4/3; Referred to Ways and Means

*[HB 2720: Study of Virtual Public Charter Schools](#): Directs Department of Ed to conduct study related to certain virtual public charter schools.

-Passed House Committee On Education 4/10; Referred to Ways and Means

*[HB 2845: Statewide Social Studies Standards](#): Directs Department of Ed to convene advisory group to develop statewide ethnic studies standards for adoption into existing statewide social studies standards for public K - 12.

-Passed House Committee On Education 4/17; Referred to Ways and Means

**[HB 2957: Kindergarten Student-to-Teacher Ratios](#): Establishes grant program to improve kindergarten student-to-teacher ratios in high poverty schools.

-Passed House Committee On Early Childhood & Family Supports 4/18; Referred to Ways and Means

**[HB 3103: Wireless Technology in Schools](#): Directs Department of Education to review scientific studies on potential health risks associated with repeated exposure to radiofrequency radiation emitted from wireless computer network technology and wireless communication devices.

-DIED

*[SB 280: Oregon Studies](#): Appropriates funds to Department of Ed for purposes of developing academic content standards for Oregon Studies and preparing materials to support teacher training and classroom instruction in Oregon Studies.

-Passed Senate Committee On Education 4/11; Referred to Ways and Means

*[SB 813: Composition of Governing Boards of Public Universities](#): Requires each governing board of public university to include one voting undergraduate student member and one voting graduate student member.

-DIED

6. WORKING FAMILY SUPPORT

>*[HB 2005: Pay Equity](#): Provides pay equity provisions for comparable work. (>[SB 752](#))

-Passed House 3/28; Referred to Senate Workforce

>[HB 2193: Fair Workweek](#): This grants employees Reporting Pay and the Right to Request. It gives guidelines for some employers to provide a good faith estimate of hours, 14-day notice of the schedule, predictability pay and priority access to additional hours, among other provisions, to allow employees to better plan their hours and income.

-Passed House Committee On Business and Labor on 4/18; in House Rules

>*[HB 3087: Family Medical Leave Insurance \(FAMLI\)](#): Requires 3/5 majority. Creates family and medical leave insurance program, funded by employers and employees, to provide employee with partial wages while on family medical or military leave.

-Passed House Committee On Early Childhood and Family Supports 4/18; Referred to Ways and Means

**[HB 3096: Negative Option Fraud](#): Requires financial institution to report to Department of Consumer and Business Services customer complaint concerning improper charges to customer's credit card or debit card or improper withdrawals from customer's deposit account.

-DIED

*[SB 398: Awareness of Earned Income Tax Credit](#): Requires pay stub summary to include notice of potential availability of earned income tax credit to employee.

-Passed Senate 4/12; On Speaker's Desk

**[SB 828: Employee Work Schedules](#): Requires employer to pay employee equivalent of at least four hours of work if employee is scheduled or called in to work but, due to employer, does not work entire shift.

-Passed Senate Committee On Workforce 4/17; Referred to Rules

7. ENVIRONMENT

*[HB 2131: Safe Transport of Hazardous Materials](#): Directs Environmental Quality Commission to adopt rules applying certain oil spill prevention and emergency response planning requirements to railroads that own or operate high hazard train routes in Oregon.

-Passed House Committee On Energy and Environment 4/17; Referred to Ways and Means

[HB 2135: Carbon Limits](#): “Cap and Invest” Enforcing carbon limits and putting a price on this pollution will make large polluters pay for the “external costs” to our environmental and human health. It will cap climate pollution; price all qualified greenhouse gas emissions under the cap; and invest proceeds from pricing climate pollution into clean energy like wind, solar, public transit, energy efficiency, etc. A minimum of 35% of proceeds will be invested to reduce pollution and climate impacts experienced by low-income and rural communities, communities of color, and impacted workers in Oregon. (**SB 557 DIED** but was folded into HB 2135: requires Environmental Quality Commission to adopt by rule statewide greenhouse gas emissions goal for 2025, and limits for years 2035 and 2050.)

-Passed House Committee On Energy and Environment 4/17; Referred to Ways and Means

**[HB 2669: Community Right to Know](#): Makes local community right to know regulatory programs for toxic substances easier for cities to implement.

-DIED

*[HB 2681: Residential Energy](#): Extends sunset for tax credit for construction or installation of alternative energy devices.

-Passed House Committee On Energy and Environment 4/10; Referred to Committee On Tax Credits

*[HB 2711: Hydraulic Fracturing](#): Imposes moratorium until December 31, 2026, on use of hydraulic fracturing for oil and gas exploration and production in Oregon.

-Passed House Committee On Energy and Environment 4/12; Headed to House Floor

**[HB 2748: Wood Stoves](#): Requires Environmental Quality Commission to adopt a grant program to help local communities reduce wood smoke through a woodstove replacement rebate program and education.

**[HB 2725](#) will request the funding for this program.

-Passed House 4/12; Referred to Ways and Means

**[HB 3105: Household Hazardous Waste](#): Establishes product stewardship program for household hazardous waste. ([SB 199](#))

-Passed House Committee On Energy and Environment 4/12; Headed to House Floor

*[HB 3269: Oregon Global Warming Commission](#): Changes name of Oregon Global Warming Commission to Oregon Climate Change Commission and provides funds.

-Passed House Committee On Energy and Environment 4/17; Referred to Ways and Means

[SB 847: State Trust Lands](#): (**Elliott State Forrest**) Creates process for State Land Board, Department of State Lands and Legislative Assembly to coordinate transfer of certain trust lands managed for benefit of Common School Fund that have limited performance potential as assets of Common School Fund to certain other public bodies better positioned to manage lands for benefit of public.

-Passed Senate Committee On Environment and Natural Resources 4/12; Referred to Ways and Means

**[SB 871: Residential Demolitions](#): Gives cities and counties authority to request notification about asbestos and lead before issuing permit to demolish a residential building.

-Passed Senate Committee On Environment and Natural Resources 4/17; Referred to Ways and Means

*[SB 1008: Relating to diesel](#): Beginning January 1, 2018, requires certain public improvement contracts to reserve 1% of total contract price for performing repowers or retrofits of certain diesel engines used in course of performing contract. ([HB 2138](#))

-Passed Senate Committee On Environment and Natural Resources 4/17; Referred to Rules and scaled back to just require an inventory off-road equipment with dirty diesel engines, and authorizes the state to use Volkswagen settlement money for clean diesel projects.

**[SB 1047: Toxics in Schools](#): Requires Department of Education, in consultation with OHA, to disseminate information and model plans for school testing for elevated levels of toxics.

-DIED, but we are trying to re-introduce it as a priority bill

8. TRANSPORTATION

[HB 2667: Vision Zero](#): Establishes Task Force on Vision Zero: Achieving Zero Traffic Crashes, Injuries and Fatalities.

-DIED

*[HB 2532: Transportation](#): Directs Oregon Transportation Commission to establish a quantitative system for scoring and ranking transportation projects that are being considered by Commission for inclusion in Statewide Transportation Improvement Program.

-DIED

*[HB 2585: Vehicle Registration Fees](#): Alters passenger motor vehicle registration fee from flat rate to fee based on formula.

-DIED

**[HB 2913: Studded Tires](#): Imposes fee on retail sale of studded tires and on installation of studs in tires.

-DIED

*[HB 2693: Youth Transit](#): Establishes grant program under which Department of Education awards grants to school districts for percentage of certain student transportation costs for which school district does not receive any amount in distributions from State School Fund.

-Passed House Committee On Education 4/12; Referred to Ways and means

Omnibus Major Transportation Package, no bill number yet:

Oregon needs to invest in the infrastructure and services that most meet Oregonians' needs: rural and urban transit, safe walking and biking options, clean air solutions, and public accountability. Our state must move beyond the old highways-focused approach and invest in one that is health- and people-focused.

9. GUN VIOLENCE PREVENTION/ PUBLIC SAFETY

**[HB 2130: Preventing Access to Firearms by Minors](#): Creates crime of endangering a minor by allowing access to a firearm.

-DIED

[HB 2355: Recording Data about Officer-Initiated Stops](#): Directs Oregon Criminal Justice Commission to develop method for recording data for officer-initiated pedestrian and traffic stops.

-Passed House Committee On Judiciary 3/30; Referred to Ways and Means

**[HB 2594: Law Enforcement Officers](#): Allows nonimmigrant authorized to enter United States under COFA (Alliance between USA and three Pacific Island Nations) to be a law enforcement officer.

-Passed House Floor 2/20; In Senate Committee On Judiciary

>[HB 2793: Conviction of Commercial Sexual Solicitation](#): Requires defendant, upon conviction of commercial sexual solicitation to notify court of all licenses, certificates, permits and registrations the person holds.

-Passed House Committee On Judiciary 4/18; Headed to House Floor

>[HB 3078: Reducing Excessive Sentences](#): Addresses Oregon's excessive sentences for addiction-driven drug and property crimes disproportionately impacting women and people of color. Realigns drugs and property crime sentencing to create savings to reinvest into local communities to provide accountability, addiction and mental health treatment, and victims' services, rather than opening a new women's prison.

-Passed House Committee On Judiciary 4/18; Referred to Rules

>[HB 3176: Victim Protections](#): Authorizes the use of a pseudonym, initials or other signifier instead of the name of the witness or victim in an indictment of specific circumstances in order to protect victims from tampering or intimidation. Applies to violent and sex crimes.

>[HB 3279: The Janitorial Registry](#): Requires property services contractor to register with Commissioner of Bureau of Labor and Industries. Requires BOLI and DCBS to adopt rules for property services contractors and farmworker camp operators to provide training to employees with respect to sexual harassment, discrimination, and whistleblower protection.

*[HB 3404: Child Safety Systems](#): Requires children under two years of age to be properly secured in car seat in rear-facing position.

-Passed House 4/10; Referred to Senate Health Care

*[HB 3380: Inmates with Children](#): Modifies eligibility for Family Sentencing Alternative Pilot Program.

-Passed House Committee On Judiciary 4/17; Referred to Ways and Means

>[SB 242: Fund the YWCA](#): Provides funds to the YWCA of Greater Portland to continue the Family Preservation Project at Coffee Creek Correctional Facility at its current level. (Same as **HB 3380**)

-Passed Senate Committee On Human Services 4/3; Referred to Ways and Means

>[SB 249: Victim of Sex Trafficking](#): Allows a person to file a motion to vacate a judgment of conviction for prostitution if the person was a victim of sex trafficking at the time.

-Passed Senate 4/5; Referred to House Committee On Judiciary

>[SB 250: Victim of Sex Trafficking](#): Creates an affirmative defense to the crime of prostitution if the defendant was arrested because they are a victim of sex trafficking.

-Passed Senate 4/5; Referred to House Committee On Judiciary

[SB 496: Recording of Grand Jury Proceedings](#): Directs presiding judges of judicial districts within state to ensure proceedings before grand jury are recorded.

-Passed Senate Committee On Judiciary 4/18; Referred to Ways and Means

[SB 505: Grand Jury Proceedings](#): Directs district attorney to ensure proceedings before grand jury are recorded.

-Passed Senate Committee On Judiciary 4/18; Referred to Ways and Means

>[SB 797: Boyfriend/Charleston Loophole](#): Prohibits firearm sale by gun dealer or private party if State Police are unable to determine whether recipient is qualified to receive firearm. Modifies definition of relationship status pertaining to types of court orders and misdemeanor convictions that prohibits person from possessing firearms. Prohibits someone convicted of stalking from possessing firearm unless person obtains relief from prohibition.

-DIED (will be folded into another bill with SB 764 to be heard in Senate Rules)

[HB 764: Relating to Firearms](#): Directs Department of State Police to study reasons for certain denials of concealed handgun license applications and report results to interim committees of Legislative Assembly related to judiciary on or before February 1, 2019. Requires more training to get a CHL, and changes minimum age to 18 for service members.

-DIED (will be folded into another bill with SB 797 to be heard in Senate Rules)

[HB 868: Extreme Risk Protection Orders](#): Creates process for obtaining extreme risk protection order prohibiting person from possessing firearms when court finds that person presents imminent risk, or risk in foreseeable future, of suicide or causing injury to other persons.

-DIED, but resurrected: SB 868 was folded into [SB 719, -5](#), which Passed Senate Judiciary and is headed to the Senate floor
